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Grant Money Well Spent

Ohio Horseman's Council annual monetary grant programs are designed to give assistance for equine-related projects that build relationships and enhance the community. There is a \$5000 Matching Grant distributed to one or more chapters and a \$750 Regional Monetary Grant awarded to a county chapter within each of the five regions in the State of Ohio.

To provide additional assistance, Ohio State Parks awarded an additional \$10,000 to East Fork State Park (Clermont) and \$2,500 to Caesar Creek State Park (Warren) under the Ohio Horseman's Council and Ohio State Parks partnership program.

25th Gibby Winner Recognized

The Erie County Metroparks and all Ohio riders can say a huge "thank you" to Lynn and Tim Sparks for their efforts on Edison Woods bridle trails in the NW region. As this year's Gibby winners, they represent dedication and determination. Lynn, a founding member of the Erie County Chapter of OHC, established a vital partnership with the Metroparks to help establish and maintain the trails at Edison Woods. This partnership was necessary due to the strict requirements from the land management agency, which considered the land wetlands and imposed specific maintenance requirements for the trails. For 30 years, the Sparks have led the effort to maintain the trails, which rank 14th out of 100+ trail systems in Ohio for recorded trail mileage.

Congratulations to all OHC volunteers around the state who are committed to improving Ohio's trails for all equestrians to enjoy! Your invaluable work, often done behind the scenes, does not go unnoticed. The Gibby award is named after Wilbur 'Gibby' Gibson, a dedicated volunteer who promoted trails and riding at Barkcamp and changed the relationship between ODNR and horse user groups so equestrians can enjoy bridle trails throughout the state on park and forest lands. In 2025, the Gibby Award celebrated its 25th year, a testament to the enduring commitment of volunteers like the Sparks and you.

OHC Foundation Offers Value for Donors & County Chapters

As a member of the OHC you are also a member of the OHC Foundation. The function of the Foundation is to assist you in your ongoing efforts to support and promote the recreation equine owner. It provides an avenue for donor contributions, supporting your efforts, to be used as a charitable contribution by the donor for income tax filings.

The Foundation is an Ohio 501(C)(3) not-for-profit organization. One hundred (100%) of all monetary donations are used as directed by the donors. Further, the OHC and its County Chapters and the OHC Foundation are exempt from paying state sales tax.
